Residential Lock Box



If you don't already have a lock box affixed beside your front door, please consider installing one now. Every time I see emergency vehicles at La Solana I hope the first responders are able to quickly enter the unit.

A lock box is a heavy metal box containing a resident's door key and can only be opened by the Surprise Fire Department. The key, stored in the lock box, is accessed in order to gain entry into your home. Especially important for residents who live alone, the lock box may mean the difference between life and death.
